## § 195.50 Reporting Accidents

### Hazardous Liquid Pipeline Systems (changes underlined)

# Reporting Criteria Changes – 1990-Current

## § 191.3 Definition of Incident

### Gas Transmission, Gas Gathering, and Gas Distribution Pipeline Systems (changes underlined)

Current 2011	1990
<p>Incident means any of the following events:</p> <p>(1) An event that involves a release of gas from a pipeline, or of liquefied natural gas, <u>liquefied petroleum gas, refrigerant gas, or gas from an LNG facility, and that results in one or more of the following consequences:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>(i) A death, or personal injury necessitating in-patient hospitalization;</li><li>(ii) <u>Estimated property damage of \$50,000 or more, including loss to the operator and others, or both, but excluding cost of gas lost;</u></li><li>(iii) <u>Unintentional estimated gas loss of three million cubic feet or more;</u></li></ul> <p>(2) An event that results in an emergency shutdown of an LNG facility. <u>Activation of an emergency shutdown system for reasons other than an actual emergency does not constitute an incident.</u></p> <p>(3) An event that is significant in the judgment of the operator, even though it did not meet the criteria of paragraphs (1) or (2) <u>of this definition.</u></p>	<p>Incident means any of the following events:</p> <p>(1) An event that involves a release of gas from a pipeline or of liquefied natural gas or gas from an LNG facility and</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>(i) A death, or personal injury necessitating in-patient hospitalization; or</li><li>(ii) Estimated property damage, including cost of gas lost, of the operator or others, or both, of \$50,000 or more.</li></ul> <p>(2) An event that results in an emergency shutdown of an LNG facility.</p> <p>(3) An event that is significant, in the judgment of the operator, even though it did not meet the criteria of paragraphs (1) or (2).</p>
