

Themes from Day One

- VIS Recommendation – concerns with FOIA and transparency
- Operators play a vital role in engagement (some don't if not required)
- Opportunity to bring diverse groups to the table
- Leverage digital platforms, where applicable
- Difficult conversations are inevitable...focus on constructive conversations
- Public information → public awareness → public engagement → public inclusion
- Engagement may yield an increase in trust

Pipeline Safety Awareness and Engagement Group

Draft Charter (Proposed)

- Establish a voluntary ad hoc group (not a federal advisory committee)
- Time frame: Summer 2019
- Purpose:
 - Pipeline stakeholders participate in a voluntary forum
 - Engage and collaborate on pipeline safety opportunities
 - Collectively advance pipeline safety
- Scope: Pipeline safety awareness and engagement matters jurisdictional to PHMSA



Pipeline Safety Awareness and Engagement Group

Draft Charter

- Objectives:
 - Collaborate and share innovative awareness and engagement best practices for continued improvement
 - Raise gaps, issues and concerns in pipeline awareness and engagement and collaborate on ways stakeholders may address them
 - Share pipeline awareness and engagement opportunities and ideas for consideration for national or individual programs



Pipeline Safety Awareness and Engagement Group

Draft Charter

- Support: PHMSA provides meeting support
- PHMSA Lead: Organizes and facilitates meetings
 - Prepares agendas
 - Attends and chairs meetings
- Meeting Frequency:
 - Meet on a semi-annual basis or as needed.
 - Guest speakers with specialized expertise may be



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Pipeline Safety Awareness and Engagement Group

Draft Charter

- Charter Renewal/Termination:
 - Renewed two years after its effective date
 - Renewed at the discretion of PHMSA's Leadership
 - If not renewed, the group will sunset
- Membership:
 - Members will participate voluntarily
 - Diverse pipeline safety stakeholders (balanced perspectives)



Pipeline Safety Awareness and Engagement Group

Representative Membership Groups

- PHMSA
- Federal agency(ies) with pipeline safety and engagement interests;
- State government officials responsible for pipeline safety
- Local government officials affected by pipeline safety matters and/or responsible for land use planning near pipelines;
- Members of the public and/or safety advocacy groups;
- Members of the excavation safety community;
- Members of the emergency response community;
- Industry stakeholders, including operators of pipeline facilities; and
- Other entities or pipeline safety stakeholder groups



Pipeline Safety Awareness and Engagement Group

Draft Charter

- Membership:
 - No more than 20 members
 - Members will be selected by the PHMSA Associate Administrator for Pipeline Safety (or a designee)
 - PHMSA may accept nominations and select volunteers to participate
- Subgroups:
 - May be formed to address specific tasks needed but the Group

Draft Charter
