Under this grant, the Georgia Public Service Commission will:

• Enforce laws and regulations of the damage prevention process

Workscope

Under the terms of the grant agreement, the Grantee will address the following elements listed in 49 USC §60134 through the actions it has specified in its Application.

• Element (7): Enforcement of State damage prevention laws and regulations for all aspects of the damage prevention process, including public education and the use of civil penalties for violations assessable by the appropriate State authority.

Accomplishments for this period (Item 1 under Article IX, <u>Section 9.01 Progress Report</u>: "A comparison of actual accomplishments to the objectives established for the period.")

For the mid-term progress report, the 2012 grant request continues to fund a Field Investigator assigned to investigations of third party damages to buried utilities. The Field Investigator position has received continued funding by the SDP Grant since 2008, and has proved to be a valuable resource for both damage investigations and public education presentations. Additionally, the Field Investigator working under this grant is responsible for assessing civil penalties for probable violations of the Georgia Utility Facility Protection Act (GUFPA). The specific actions taken by the Field Investigator are detailed below.

The Field Investigator position support by the Grant has made significant contributions to the Commission's damage prevention program, by investigating 229 cases for the period September 2012-March 2013 and assessing \$758,000 in civil penalties and mitigating \$575,000. The Field Investigator has attended 21 meetings/event and reached 442 attendees. The Field Investigator is also responsible for oversight in several large project meetings throughout the state to facilities damage prevention efforts with a host of utility owners, excavators, and locators.
